MEMORANDUM

I. The Government of Japan, prompted by a genuine desire to come to an enforceable understanding with the Government of the United States in order that the two countries by their joint efforts may secure the peace of the Pacific area and thereby contributing toward the realization of world peace, has continued negotiations with the utmost sincerity since April last with the Government of the United States regarding the adjustment and advancement of Japanese-American relations and the stabilization of the Pacific area.

However, since the American Government has made the proposal of November 26th as a result of frequent communications with Great Britain, Australia, the Netherlands and Chungking, and presumably by agreeing to the wishes of the Chungking régime on the question of China, it must be concluded that all these countries are in agreement with the Japanese proposal.
